Prom Season – Having Fun Safely



As the academic year comes to a close, many Year 11 and 13 students will be eagerly anticipating the opportunity to celebrate the conclusion of their respective academic chapters.

Prom night for year 11s is a particularly special milestone, celebrated much more now than ever. It is crucial to ensure that our young people stay safe while they enjoy the festivities, especially at any after-party they may be planning to attend.

Here are some key safety tips to discuss with any young person embarking on prom celebrations:

Plan ahead: Encourage your child to share their plans for the night, including the party location, who they'll be with, and how they'll get there and back. Make sure they have a safe, reliable way to return home, whether it's a pre-arranged lift from a trusted adult or a reputable taxi service.

Stay in groups: There is safety in numbers - remind your child to stay with their friends throughout the night and to look out for each other. It is essential that they know never to leave anyone behind or alone, including anyone going off with someone they don't know, especially if they are under the influence of alcohol or any other substance.

Know the host: Make sure your child is attending parties hosted by responsible individuals. If the party is at someone's home, there should be an adult present to ensure things stay under control.

Avoid substances: Discuss the dangers of alcohol and drugs. Many young people may feel peer pressure to include, but it's important they understand the risks involved, including impaired judgment and the potential for dangerous situations.

Emergency contacts: Ensure your child has a charged mobile phone with important contacts saved, including yours and other trusted adults. Remind them that they can call you at any time if they feel unsafe or need assistance. Inform them to always keep their phones with them and not to leave it on a table or bar. Make sure that the phone 'find my location' is switched on so you know where your child is.

Of course, some of these subjects are tricky to discuss with young people who feel they want to be treated like adults, but by having open conversations about these safety measures and stressing that this advice is about them taking responsibility for themselves and their friends, we can help our young people have a fun

and memorable prom night while staying safe. Involvement and guidance from trusted adults in their lives is key to making sure any celebrations are a positive experience for everyone involved.


