

Domestic Abuse Advice

Introduction

Domestic abuse can happen to anyone, in all kinds of relationships regardless of ethnicity, religion, culture, age, sexuality, disability or gender and can have serious consequences for individuals and families affected. If you are experiencing domestic abuse Hart District Council Housing Service will be able to offer help and support.

If you think you are in an abusive situation, remember you are not alone. Every year around 1.4 million women and 751,000 men suffer some form of domestic abuse. This equates to 4.4% of the population.

One in four women, one in six men will be affected by domestic abuse at some point in their lifetime. In addition, one in four same sex relationships will be abusive at some point

It is important to remember that domestic abuse is about power and control, and responsibility for the violence and abuse lies entirely with the person committing these acts. It is important not to blame yourself. If you think you are experiencing domestic abuse, there are 3 important steps you can take that will help you to change your situation:

- Recognize that it is happening to you
- Accept that you are not to blame
- Get help and support

This leaflet is designed to help you consider what action you can take, especially in relation to your housing situation.

What is domestic abuse?

Domestic abuse is defined by the government as "any incident or pattern of incidents of controlling, coercive or threatening behavior, violence or abuse between those aged 16 or over who are or have been intimate partners or family members regardless of gender or sexuality."

This can include but is not limited to the following types of abuse:

- psychological and emotional
- physical
- sexual
- financial
- verbal
- stalking and harassment
- Coercive control

Controlling behavior is "a range of acts designed to make a person subordinate and/or dependent by isolating them from sources of support, exploiting their resources and capacities for personal gain, depriving them of the means needed for independence, resistance and escape and regulating their everyday behavior."

Coercive behavior is "an act or a pattern of acts of assault, threats, humiliation and intimidation or other abuse that is used to harm, punish, or frighten their victim."

This definition also includes 'honor' based violence, female genital mutilation (FGM) and forced marriage.

Where can I go to talk about my situation?

The Hampshire Domestic Abuse Service offers help and support services to victims and survivors of abuse, children living with domestic abuse, people who may be abusing and hurting someone and professionals seeking advice. This service can be contacted on 03300 165 112

There are other organizations that you may also wish to contact for advice and support. We have listed some of these contacts at the end of this leaflet.

These services can provide you with comprehensive and confidential advice so that you are better able to make an informed choice about what course of action is most appropriate to your circumstances.

It is important to remember that the decision to take action and what action to take, is yours and no-one else should make it for you but getting help and advice can help you make informed decisions and provide practical and emotional support.

What help can I get to enable me to remain in my own home?

By taking action to protect yourself, you will also be taking steps towards ensuring that you are able to stay

in your own home. Injunctions and security measures will help ensure your home becomes a safer place to be. There are also legal powers that can be used to let you return to your property if you have been forced out.

These options apply whether you are a tenant of a Local Housing Authority or Registered Social Landlord such as a Housing Association, or if you own your own home or are renting in the private sector.

The Duty Housing Solutions Officer in the Hart District Council Housing Service will be able to offer advice and information about how to access the above remedies. The Housing Solutions Team will be able to make appropriate referrals to agencies that can offer support.

This includes Hampshire Domestic Abuse Partnership, which will provide practical help in securing your home. You can speak to our Housing Solutions team whether you are a tenant, a homeowner or living with family or friends. You may also wish to discuss the options available to you with a solicitor.

Will the Council help me if I leave my home due to domestic violence?

If you are affected by domestic abuse and feel unsafe in your home, please do not hesitate to contact the Duty Housing Solutions Officer in the Hart District Council Housing Service.

We will work with you in a sympathetic and confidential manner.

We will need to ask you questions about your circumstances to ensure you receive advice and assistance appropriate to your individual situation. The Council will not contact the perpetrator as part of our enquiries and you are not under any obligation to pursue any assistance you may be offered.

If you, or a member of your family, are affected by domestic abuse, the Council may have a duty to assist you under homelessness legislation. If the Council considers you eligible for assistance, it may have a duty to ensure that temporary accommodation is made available to you, in a place where you are no longer at risk of violence. This accommodation could be out of the area to ensure your safety.

Dependent upon your circumstances, family make-up, and where possible your preference, the accommodation you are offered may be a short term refuge placement.

Hart's Housing Solutions team can access refuge accommodation across Hampshire and we will work with other relevant services to ensure that you are placed appropriately to provide you with the best protection and support. You can approach any local authority in England and Wales for assistance if you are at risk in the area you are living.

The local authority you present to may have a duty to ensure that alternative accommodation is available temporarily, where you and your household are not at risk.

I am in receipt of Housing Benefit/Universal Credit – If I leave my accommodation temporarily, how will I afford to pay rent elsewhere?

If you are on a low income or in receipt of Housing Benefit/Universal Credit, you may be able to claim assistance with Housing costs on the property you are temporarily placed in, in addition to the accommodation you have fled, if your intention is to return to your normal home if and when safe to do so. You'll need to let Universal Credit know through your journal.

If you are placed into temporary accommodation, you will need to make a claim for Housing benefit with the Local Authority who placed you.

If you are currently in receipt of Universal credit, you will need to claim Housing Benefit whilst residing in temporary accommodation.

If you are still in receipt of Universal Credit Housing costs when staying in temporary accommodation, you should contact Universal Credit to update them on your current situation through your journal and confirm your intention will be return to your address if and when it is safe to do so if this is the case.

What can I do to protect myself?

Whatever your circumstances it is best to develop a safety plan to ensure you keep yourself and any children safe. If you are thinking of leaving your partner, it is important to get support and plan this carefully as this can often increase the level of abuse. There are several options available to help you make changes to your situation and provide protection.

These options include:

- Getting help and practical support to secure your own home and increase your personal safety
 Getting an injunction – this is a type of court order which can protect you (and any children you may have) against the person who is being abusive to you (known as the perpetrator).
- Using legal powers to remove the perpetrator from the property where they are not the tenant or co-owner of the property

The Hampshire Domestic Abuse Service can offer support and advice to help you develop a safety plan and increase the protection in your home. They will also help you explore your options for legal protection for yourself and your children

The Citizen's Advice Bureau has access to the Law Society's 'Solicitors Regional Directory', which lists solicitors who specialize in matrimonial / family work. You may also be able to access this Directory at your local library or through the websites that are detailed at the end of this leaflet.

The National Centre for Domestic Violence provides free legal and injunction advice and can help you get injunctions in place within 24 hours if there has been a recent, violent incident or threat. Contact information for all of these organizations is given at the end of this leaflet.

What options are available to assist me to pursue alternative accommodation on a longer-term basis where I will no longer be at risk?

Whether you have had to move to temporary accommodation or are able to safely remain in your own home, you may wish to consider what housing options are available to you in the longer term and the Housing Support team will be able to assist you to explore your options.

If you are not already a secure, assured or introductory tenant of a local housing authority or registered provider, you may be entitled to join the Housing Register. If you are a secure, assured or introductory tenant you can also apply to the Housing Register for a transfer. You may also be eligible to apply to join waiting lists for accommodation in other areas, and we would recommend that you contact local housing authorities for the particular

areas you are interested in moving to directly, for further advice and assistance. We will be able to help you with this if you need assistance and can help you find out more information about local qualifying criteria.

You may also wish to consider seeking alternative accommodation in the private rented sector. The Housing Solutions team will be able to offer advice and information about how you can access accommodation in the private sector.

You may also be interested in exploring the options available to you for affordable home ownership. The Housing Solutions team has information available on these options and can offer advice on the current schemes available.
