Did you know that an estimated one in five people in Hart could have a disability? This includes residents with:

- impaired vision
- · motor difficulties
- cognitive impairments or learning disabilities
- deafness or impaired hearing

If something could work better for you on our website, tell us! That's what one blind user did, enabling us to make looking up his bin calendar much easier for him and others with a visual impairment.

In the same way that we ensure there are ramps for wheelchair users, our websites need to be accessible too. Digital or web accessibility means making content clear and simple enough for most people to understand it, while presenting it in a way that supports people who need extra help.

We try to make our website easy to read and use but we know we don't always get it right. That's why we regularly ask residents to help us make improvements.

Hit 2025 running!

Get your 2025 fitness off to a great start at Frogmore Leisure Centre. Following the gym upgrade at Hart Leisure Centre last year, Frogmore is getting its own makeover in January 2025. Over £300,000 of investment will see all current kit replaced with the latest models, exciting new additions and complete redecoration.

Earlier this year, the sports hall floor was also given a revamp with a new rubber covering and remarked lines.

Joe Noble, General Manager of Frogmore Leisure Centre, says: "On top of the recent sports hall investment we are hugely excited about this gym

refurbishment and look forward to seeing the local community take full advantage of these facilities, to keep active and improve their health."

Heating up with heat pumps

We've been awarded £1.6 million towards the cost of installing heat pumps in three of our key buildings.

The funding, from the government's Public Sector Decarbonisation Scheme, will be used to replace most of the current old heating systems in the Civic Office building in Fleet, Frogmore Leisure Centre and The Harlington, Fleet.

Replacing fossil fuel heating systems with more sustainable energy sources is essential in helping to reduce a building's carbon footprint.

Carbon savings for our waste services

In April we took a positive step towards our carbon neutral goals as most of our kerbside waste and recycling trucks swapped diesel for a low-carbon biofuel.

In the five months of April to August this change produced savings of nearly 140 tonnes CO2 equivalent (tCO2e). This saving is the same as the carbon produced by:



Driving around the world 19 times (492,000 miles) in a medium-sized petrol car



Taking a domestic flight from London to Sydney 30 times (515,000 kilometres)



Disposing of 280 tonnes of household residual waste via landfill

Gobbling up your food waste in 2025

Increasing the amount we can all recycle is one of our key aims. We're excited to announce that plans are afoot to roll out weekly kerbside food waste collections across Hart.

Each property will be provided with a small container to use in the kitchen and a larger caddy to put out each week with their waste or recycling bins for collection.

The government's position is that all local authorities should implement food waste collections by the end of March 2026. We plan to introduce this service in advance of this date, in late 2025.

Dates and details are currently being confirmed and we'll share more information on our website and social media as it is available.

Could you ditch the glitter?



Generating your own electricity through solar energy is not just good for the environment, it could save you money on costly energy bills too.

Upgrade your insulation



Many homes don't have adequate insulation. With grants available to help with the cost, this doesn't need to be an expensive investment but could help cut your energy consumption and save money.

Eat more plants



You could take part in Veganuary, but you don't need to eat vegan to make an impact. Adding more fruit and veg to your diet and reducing meat can make a massive difference. And if you eat local seasonal produce, you're reducing the distance your food has to travel and supporting local farmers too.

Making a difference in our communities

We know many people in Hart may be struggling to pay for essentials like energy bills and food.

With the rising cost of living, we are working with local partners to help residents through these challenging times.

This year and last, we awarded grants to a number of community groups and organisations to help them support those most in need.

Winter relief from grants

Community groups that received Council funding to support Hart families have described the difference the grants have made.

We made seven awards through our Winter Grants Scheme for projects that increased standards of living and wellbeing within local communities.

Fleet Phoenix received funding for their Open Door project, providing food, hygiene products, clothing and day-to-day living help. They said: "The funding has enabled us to make a massive difference to young people. Feedback has shown we're making a difference in supporting families to make ends meet, an opportunity to 'start again' and improving their mental health and relationships."

Christians Against Poverty, which received funding to run 'Cook Well for Less' sessions in Fleet and Church Crookham, said: "So far, we've run three workshops for everyone aged from five 70! They create such happiness and provide skills that enable people to cook for friends and family."

Play to support good causes

Hart Lottery is a weekly online community lottery, raising money for local charities, community groups and sports clubs. Since we launched the lottery in 2017, it has raised over £180,000 for good causes in Hart.

We have just finished our latest round of funding for the coming winter. Our grant schemes have included Climate Change, Cost of Living and Armed Forces support, with successful bids to be announced soon.

Could you be entitled to pension credits?

It's estimated that up to 850,000 pensioner households may be entitled to Pension Credit but don't claim it.

Pension credit is a benefit that gives people extra money to help with their living costs if they are over State Pension Age and on a low income. As well as topping up income, it can provide a passport to help with things like rent, Council Tax, Cold Weather



Check your eligibility today at www.gov.uk/pension-credit-calculator

Payments and a free TV licence for people aged 75 and over. People need to claim if they are entitled as this won't be paid automatically.

Some pensioners think because they've got savings or own their home they won't get any Pension Credit. But they could still qualify and should check their eligibility.

We received £1 million from the UK Shared Prosperity Fund which we used to help fund community hubs and support employment and skills for young people.

The Fund aims to improve pride in place and increase life chances across the UK.

Funding for Yateley Men's Shed has enabled them to upgrade their facilities and create a welcoming space. Members make and repair items, supporting projects in their local communities as well as improving wellbeing and reducing loneliness.

Shed secretary John Stephens said: "We urgently needed an extension to give us our own toilet and water facilities and a better environment to meet, have a cuppa and a chat."

Thanks to the UKSPF grant and a lot of commitment from our members, we recently enjoyed our first meeting in our new facility.

For St Barnabas Church, the funding has benefited their community hub serving Darby Green, Frogmore and Blackwater.

Reverend Faith Bailey said: "The grant is enabling us to enhance our building to make it more flexible. The building hosts a range of cafes for local groups, a youth group run by Vison for Youth two evenings a week, a pre-school, a food bank, and the local community pantry."

Going for green!

Five of our countryside sites retained their Green Flag Award this year, recognising them as some of the very best in the UK.

One of the sites, Fleet Pond, has received the award for the 13th year in a row. It joins Hartley Wintney Central Commons, Elvetham Heath Local Nature Reserve, Hartland Country Park and Edenbrook Country Park who all retain their green flag status.



Spot the difference!

Quite a change for the steps into Fleet Pond nature reserve from the train station car park!

A huge thank you to Octavius Infrastructure for helping to improve the facilities at Fleet Pond. Octavius not only carried out these works, but they also funded it all. Works included the replacement of old jetty boards along with the pictured steps renovation.

Winter works at Whitewater Meadows

This winter, significant works will be taking place at Whitewater Meadows Country Park to improve the site for both people and wildlife.

The project will include the creation of seasonal pools and wetlands. The mill channel, in the bottom field, will be re-meandered to increase the wetland habitat for wildlife, which will also improve site drainage. As well as this, additional tree and hedgerow planting will take place.

A new path is being laid from the car park to the play area. The materials dug up during the works will also be reused to raise existing paths. We thank you in advance for your patience whilst this work takes place.

Last year our Countryside rangers carried out a survey at Edenbrook Country Park to find out what facilities teenagers would like to see. Equipment for teens is often less represented in areas than those for younger children, and we are keen to make sure there is something for everyone in Hart.

Calisthenics came out on top, and we're pleased to say that this facility is now in place, alongside the fantastic new bike tracks launched in June.

So what is calisthenics? It's a type of workout that uses your body weight with minimum equipment. Examples of calisthenics exercises include push-ups, squats, crunches, planks, burpees, pull-ups and lunges.

The new equipment is made up of a series of bars and hoops and set up to championship specification bar sizes and layout. It includes parallel bars, ultra-wide pull-up bars (2m each),

Olympic ring brackets, wide monkey bars and rails up to 1.2m with handstand boards above. The floor is line marked and includes low parallette bars and raised cubes.

Working together to combat fly-tipping

Fly-tipping is a blight on our district and reducing it is a priority for us and for our residents. We're tackling as many incidents as we can, but community support can help us to do more.

There's no such thing as a quiet week for our Fly-tipping Enforcement Officer at Hart. During an average week, he receives 25 reports across the district, from large dumps of building waste to green waste left in our country parks.

"We're determined to help tackle this issue, which we know is a big one for our residents," he says. "We resolve as many as we can, but with help from our community we know we could do even more."

We look through all reported fly-tips to find evidence of the culprit and follow up on CCTV.

WHAT CAN I DO?

You can help us tackle more fly-tipping in Hart by reporting any incidents you see at 01252 622122 or online at hart.fixmystreet. com. If you witness the incident this is especially important as your statement could be the key to pursuing a prosecution.

Our Fly-tipping Enforcement Officer says: "Your statement could be vital for identifying those fly-tipping in our district."

Is it fly-tipping?

What of the following do you think is fly-tipping?

- Dumping asbestos in a field
- Leaving garden waste in a wooded area by your house
- Dropping off general household waste at a cardboard and clothing bring site
- Putting an old washing machine on the pavement
- Leaving building material on a country lane





We also work closely with landowners, community groups and neighbouring authorities to share information to help with our investigations.

Regrettably though, for some incidents there isn't a lead for us to follow. This is where information our residents provide is invaluable. Witness statements help us build a strong case for even more action.

By working together, we can achieve the best possible outcome for tackling more fly-tipping in Hart.

CASE STUDY

Following the directions!

We recently prosecuted a man who dumped building waste including asbestos, in a field in Odiham.

The owner of the field had to pay to clear this, including the asbestos. We recovered these costs for him as part of the prosecution.

When clearing up, a satellite navigation device was found in the waste, which helped lead investigators to the person responsible. He has been fined £3,800 after being found guilty of two offences.

Empty properties becoming safe homes

How many homes do you think are currently empty in Hart?

With just under 43,000 homes in Hart, you might be shocked that over 700 are empty, with over 500 unoccupied for more than six months.

Properties are empty for many reasons, but with more than 1,100 applications for the housing register in Hart we're keen to see if any could be a safe home for someone.

Local landlord Vanessa contacted us when she found herself with an empty home. She says: "It's been a very positive experience and it's nice to think I've done my bit to help my lovely tenant find a suitable home.

"I was worried about renting through the Council, but the team was incredibly helpful throughout the whole process."


Are you looking for a new job in Hart, or fancy volunteering? We can help!



As technology improves, our ability to deliver digital services also increases. Our Cabinet has recently approved our new digital strategy, setting out our approach to this.


The strategy considers how it can influence the way we do things in:

Safer communities with Neighbourhood Watch

Feeling safe where you live is vital. Working together, we can make sure our communities are pleasant and secure environments for all.

You may have seen Neighbourhood Watch signs around, but do you know what Neighbourhood Watch does? As the largest volunteer-led crime prevention charity in England and Wales, with over two million households signed up, they work across local communities to empower, educate and bring together.

The schemes in our district can be a key partner for our Community Safety team when there are community issues. They can help us build an intelligence picture, reporting incidents that we may not know about and help prevent crime and antisocial behaviour. If problems arise in these areas, we can hold engagement meetings and work together to find solutions.

Learn tools to de-escalate safely

Having the tools to de-escalate situations safely is an important skill to have in our communities. For those wanting to learn these tools, free Community in Action training may be of interest.

Developed by a retired Chief Inspector who specialised in violence reduction, it equips those keen to promote peaceful resolutions with a toolkit to become an active bystander, dealing with and de-escalating real life situations and areas of concerns safely.

Christmas tree recycling

If you're planning on a real Christmas tree, don't forget you can recycle it once the decorations are down.

Leave your tree out with your garden waste bin if you subscribe to the service or check our website to find a free recycling point around the district. Our Christmas tree recycling drop-off points will be available from Thursday 2 January to Friday 31 January 2025.



The trees collected are then transformed into ProGrow Soil conditioner for gardens and wood chippings for our parks.

Garden waste takes a Christmas break

Garden waste collections stop on Saturday 21 December for a twoweek break. Garden waste customers can put their real Christmas trees out for collection with their garden waste when the service resumes from Monday 6 January.

Do you recycle small electricals?

Broken hair dryer? New electric toothbrush? We have the solution!

We'll now collect small electricals from the kerbside


for most residents in Hart. Simply leave any small electrical items on top of your waste OR recycling bin for collection. Items must be no larger than a kettle and small items such as vapes and toothbrushes should be left in a carrier bag, bread bag or similar. We also can't take loose batteries - these can be taken back to shops and supermarkets where they are sold.

We still have a little work to do to offer this to those of you who use communal bins or live in areas where we use a smaller vehicle for your waste and recycling collections. Keep an eye out for a letter inviting you to use the service in 2025.

2024 was a bumper year for elections! Running elections is a key function of ours, and we take great pride in giving our residents the chance to have their say.

On Thursday 2 May we held elections for your district councillors, with five new ones joining the Council, and the Police and Crime Commissioner. Following swiftly on, a general election was announced for Thursday 4 July. This saw a new MP for North East Hampshire and Aldershot

After a busy 2024, there are only Hampshire County Councillor elections planned, in May 2025.

What are all these elections for?

Different bodies are responsible for different things. and we know this is pretty confusing!

Your parish and town councils (who have elections every four years) are responsible for amenities such as local play parks, community centres and allotments. In Hart we have 21 parish and town councils.

Your district council (that's us!) elect a third of councillors every year, with one year off as councillors serve a four-year term. We're responsible for services such as planning, managing countryside sites, environmental health, housing, community safety and waste and recycling.

Hampshire County Council have their councillor elections in 2025. Contact them for help with roads and footpaths (including potholes), social services and education. Visit the Hampshire County Council website for more information.

Your MP can assist in a variety of ways, from making private enquiries on your behalf, to raising matters publicly in the House of Commons.
